New Year's Levee

The following Article is courtesy of the Canadian Association of Veterans in United Peacekeeping:

The CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE: IS CHANGE COMING?

A recent meeting called by Dominion Command of the Royal Canadian Legion brought into sharp focus the changing situation with regard to almost all veterans.

The Legion itself still numbers about 400,000 members but 60% of them are not veterans. Other organizations such as the Korean Veterans Association, the Gulf War Veterans Association, the Merchant Marine Association and any other grouping with a membership limited to "one of a kind", face rapidly declining numbers. Other groups such as the ANAVETS and the AFAC still have considerable strength but also face the difficulty of maintaining that strength and even trying to recruit new members.

In the peacekeeping field we have our own CAVUNP plus the existence of the CPVA. Both organizations began with a heavy emphasis on traditional peacekeeping operations but changes have occurred in both groups. Now, we in CAVUNP tend a look upon CPVA. as a membership list that is "open to anyone". CPVA tends to view us as far too stringent and narrow in our membership criteria. The end result is two small organizations that raise the question of whether or not they should be one. Certainly those outside our two associations tend to pose the rather simple question, "Why two"? An historical answer does not draw much sympathy.

The declining memberships across the board raise other questions. Will the decline in numbers result in a decline in influence in the places that matter? If so, what do we do about it? Are we better to speak to those in authority with the six separate voices that have been represented in the last few years? Or would one stronger and united voice be better? These are very legitimate questions and the first flush easy answer — "No Change" may not serve us well in the long run.

At the meeting I referred to in the opening, the Legion was putting on the table an invitation to consider change. This was not the first initiative by the Legion but it was a far more open and considerate proposal than one rose a few years ago. You will hear more about this proposal but in essence, the least objectionable approach was a Royal Canadian Legion Federation of Veterans in which the current associations would retain much of their own identity while taking advantage of the large numbers and strong infrastructure already in place within the Legion.

Each and every member needs to think about possible changes and discuss them at length. Certainly the representatives attending AGM 2008 in Winnipeg will need to address the matter even if the objective is nothing more than to authorize our National President to seek more information from the Legion and other veterans' organizations.

Tree tribute to airmen

A RED Canadian maple tree has been planted in Rowney Green to honour five Canadian airmen who died there during the Second World War. A service was held and among those paying their requests were John Hoccom and Arthur Pearsall, from the Alvechurch Ex-Services Association, and Lt Col Gary Walker, from the Canadian High Commission in London. The airmen died when their Wellington Bomber crashed in a field at Lower Park Farm, Rowney Green, on November 9, 1943.

They were flying over the area when their aircraft developed engine trouble and crashed from about 600ft, killing everyone on board.

John Hoccom, from the Alvechurch Ex-Services Association, said: "I really enjoyed the service.

"The whole day was first class and the weather was perfect which was cital because there were quite a few older people there. "It was a very worth while event and I'm relieved everything went like clockwork and everybody said it was a success."

Veterans Organizations and Legion Discuss the Way Ahead

Representatives from 14 veterans organizations met with



Legion officials at Legion House in Kanata, Ont., Nov. 16 to discuss developing a closer relationship.

Legion Honorary Grand President Charles Belzile, the chairman of the Dominion Command Veterans Unity Committee, chaired the meeting which was also attended by Dominion President Jack Frost, Dominion Secretary Duane Daly and Membership Committee Chairman Erl Kish. Also representing the Legion at the meeting were Defence Committee Chairman Lou Cuppens and member Buster Brown and Lewis MacKenzie, a member of the Veterans Unity Committee.

The Legion provided a full briefing on the Legion's organization and the range and strength of its various programs. The Legion was founded in 1926 when the Great War Veterans Association brought together many different veterans organizations that had formed after World War I. Today, its programs include seniors housing projects, the National Track and Field Championships for youth aged 13 to 17, the Legion Youth Leaders' Pilgrimage of Remembrance, support for the Encounters With Canada program, national literary and poster contests, the National Remembrance Day Ceremony and support for hundreds of cadet corps and boy scout and girl guide troops. Local charities receive about \$11.1 million from Legion branches.

The Legion's military support programs include support for the Canadian Forces championships and show tours, Operation Santa Claus for troops serving abroad, the Nijmegen Marches, Fisher House in Europe and Legion House at Ste-Anne's Hospital for veterans and the RCL Troop Morale Fund which provides Tim Hortons gift certificates for Canadian Forces members stationed at Kandahar Airfield. Following the briefing, there was a full discussion on the future way ahead to sustain the strength and viability of the veterans community.

The Legion highlighted what it considered to be the future objectives and goals for the veterans community and suggested a possible way to sustain identity and achieve those goals would be through some form of federation with the Legion. Although there was no agreement to any specific future course of action, the delegates carried a motion to continue dialogue and to meet again in October 2008.

"The response from all was very positive," said Daly. "They complimented the Legion on taking the initiative to gather the various associations together to discuss the future and indicated their desire to review future options with their own members before the October meeting."

Besides the Legion, the meeting was attended by members of the Army, Navy and Air Force Veterans in Canada, the Air Force Association of Canada, Canadian Veterans in UN Peacekeeping, Canadian Peacekeeping Veterans Association, the Royal Canadian Naval Association, Canadian Naval Air Group, Canadian Divers Association, NATO Veterans Association, Korea Veterans Association, Canadian Merchant Navy Veterans Association, Naval Officers Association, RCMP Veterans Association, National Aboriginal Veterans Association and Gulf War Veterans Association.

New Battle Honour for Fighter Squadrons

Recognition given for meritorious service in 1999
Kosovo air war

Quietly and without fanfare, Gov. Gen. Michaelle Jean approved the award of the new battle honour "Kosovo" for two CF-18 fighter squadrons last September. The honour, the

first to Canadian Forces units since "Gulf and Kuwait" was awarded for the 1990-91 Gulf War, is for their role in the little-known 1999 air campaign over the Yugoslavian province of Kosovo.

The air campaign over Kosovo - known as Operation Allied Force - was part of NATO's attempt to end Yugoslavian president Slobodan Milosevic's brutal ethnic cleansing of Albanians in Kosovo. Under Milosevic's direction, an estimated 10,000 people were slaughtered, several thousand went missing and 850,000 fled their homes. Flying their CF-18 Hornets out of Aviano Air Base in Italy, 69 pilots - supported by 250 ground crew - of 425 Tactical Fighter Squadron from CFB Bagotville, Que., and 441 Tactical Fighter Squadron from CFB Cold Lake, Alta., completed 684 combat sorties. It was the most extensive combat air campaign undertaken by Canada's air force since the Second World War.

Comprising less than two per cent of nearly 1,000 NATO warplanes, Canadian pilots flew almost 10 per cent of all bombing missions. Canadians also took part in combat air patrols and close air-support missions, but bombing runs were considered the most dangerous. Remarkably, neither 425 nor 441 squadrons suffered any losses in the 78-day bombing campaign, conducted between March 24 and June 10, 1999. During the air war, Canadian fighter-bombers dropped nearly 225,000 kilograms of gravity and precision-guided bombs, an important part of the overall NATO effort that forced Milosevic to stop his vicious assault.
